Our True King

We have not had an earthly king ruling over us since 1783 when we won independence from the British Empire. Our king prior to independence was George III, who may have been mentally ill. It is reported that he suffered mental breakdowns, hallucinations, and paranoia. One is left to wonder how things might have unfolded if King George was a better king, or at least not vexed by mental issues. Had he been more evenhanded or addressed the grievances of the American colonies, would we still be part of the British Commonwealth of nations much like Canada and Australia? Would we still have a king in Charles III, even if he is more of a figurehead than a true sovereign king? Hard to say.

We might ask how Jesus' life might have been different if the various King Herods had been of sound mind. Herod the Great, the king reigning at the time of Christ's birth, had no difficulty slaughtering all of the young boys in the vicinity of Bethlehem out of fear that a new King of the Jews had been born. Some historians have doubted this episode, but he did execute his wife Mariamne I and his sons Aristobulus IV, Alexander, and Antipater II. Emperor Augustus would quip that 'It is better to be Herod's pig than his son.' He also married one of his nieces and one of his cousins. Herod the Great's son, Herod Antipas, the Herod that reigned over Galilee during Jesus' ministry, married his half-brother Phillip's wife, Herodias, and lusted after Salome, who was Herodias' daughter. Salome was Herod Antipas's step-daughter, cousin, and niece. Herod Antipas would be dethroned by the certifiably insane Emperor Caligula through the treachery of Agrippa, who was simultaneously Herod's brother-in-law (Herodias' brother) and his nephew. Yikes.

There have been other mad monarchs over time. King Nebuchadnezzar II may have thought he was an ox or some sort of bovine. King Ludwig II of Bavaria was obsessed with building fairytale castles in an age where cannons made such fortifications obsolete. One must also wonder about the mental state of Vlad the Impaler and Ivan the Terrible, both of whom were nothing less than bloodthirsty tyrants. The list goes on and on.

Should this surprise us? Not at all. With thrones being inherited – given that competence, sanity, and benevolence are not traits that are reliably inherited especially when inbreeding occurs – there will be horrible kings and queens. We should also remember that God warns the people through the prophet Samuel when they clamored for a king: "The governance of the king who will rule you will be as follows: He will take your sons and assign them to his chariots and horses, and they will run before his chariot. He will appoint from among them his commanders of thousands and of hundreds. He will make them do his plowing and harvesting and produce his weapons of war and chariotry. He will use your daughters as perfumers, cooks, and bakers. He will take your best fields, vineyards, and olive groves, and give them to his servants. He will tithe your crops and grape harvests to give to his officials and his servants. He will take your male and female slaves, as well as your best oxen and donkeys, and use them to do his work. He will also tithe your flocks. As for you, you will become his slaves" (1Sam 8:11-17). The Lord was not warning us about insane or incompetent rulers, but human rulers in general.

Prior to Saul, God was the King of the Chosen People. They had judges, such as Joshua and Samuel, who were called by God to guide the people and settle disputes, but a king with concentrated power was never God's intent. The Lord knew the people would clamor for a king, rejecting Him in the process, just as He knew that Herod the Great and Herod Antipas would reign during Jesus' earthly life, just as He knew that Jesus would be the Son of King David. But in Jesus, we have the reiteration that it is God who is truly sovereign, who has power that no human ruler could imagine.

Nevertheless, we forget quite readily that Jesus is our one true King. We might poo-poo kings as a thing of the past, we might think we would never elect truly incompetent or mentally ill men into positions of power, but we would be wrong. We will be equally wrong to think that we can rely on mere human kings, emperors, presidents, and prime ministers. No, our allegiance belongs to the one King not subject to mental issues, incompetence, or corruption: Jesus Christ.
